Parliamentary Boundaries Review

The Boundary Commission for England (BCE) will publish its initial proposals for new Parliamentary constituency boundaries on 8 June and will be seeking local knowledge to help reshape the map. Parliamentary constituencies are changing to make the number of electors in each one more equal, and the number of constituencies in England will increase from 533 to 543. As part of an eight-week consultation process, everyone will be able to view the proposed constituency boundaries and names online and provide feedback. Thanks for this it is something that has been highlighted by NALC and SLCC.

South Cambs will be split over at least three constituencies. This has not affected the district boundaries in the past as parts of Huntingdonshire were shared with Fenland.

The greater concern is that the estimated electorate is 74,699 and the max is 77,062 this leaves 2,363 spare electors and the new Constituency has Cambourne West, Bourn Airfield, Northstowe and the large developments at St Neots. These are some of the largest developments in Cambridgeshire I know they use historic data and have not had a chance to look at the report to see what allowances are made. The report has an electorate of 7,029 and as of 15t October 2020 Cambourne had an electorate of 7,740. This reduces the float to 1,652 without the other growth elsewhere.
