I wrote to Joe and John after the last mtg with the points below to share so please accept them here as still relevant update for the forthcoming Town Council mtg with a little update :

- 1. Cultural Strategy Development in South Cambs had its first meeting on August 23 and they agree with me that Cambourne should be the main hub for piloting project activity. Unfortunately I had expected more information about available budget, but they didn't provide that info at this point. I will continue to work on this group in the interests of Cambourne residents and in particular the mental health and wellbeing benefits of participation in creative activities. I have had an initial discussion with Wysing Arts about this and they are keen to be involved so I will keep you informed and ask someone from Town Council to come along once the scope and financial scale of the strategy is a little more definite.
- 2. Scrutiny Ctte Chair is picking up the task and finish group activity looking at Gypsy, Roma and Traveller provision once again. I have my own priorities in this area, but it would be useful to have an idea of where the Town Council sits regarding provision of temporary stopping sites and also the promotion of more positive communications within social media sites that serve communities in Cambourne and across South Cambs. Please either email me the position and priorities of Town Council re GRT or let's arrange to talk it through so I can share your views with Srutiny Ctte.

## Preserving the legacy of the Windrush Generation – Monday 4th October at 18:00

As part of our 2021 Black History Month programme in partnership with Cambridge City Council, our first webinar will be hosted by Patrick Vernon OBE on the topic of preserving the legacy of the Windrush Generation.

The Windrush Generation – people arriving in the UK between 1948 and 1971 from Caribbean counties – came at the request of the British Government to help rebuild a broken Britain after World War II. 'Windrush' refers to the ship MV Empire Windrush, which docked in Tilbury (Essex) on 22 June 1948, bringing workers from Jamaica, Trinidad and Tobago, and other islands to help will post-war UK labour shortages.

After 10 years of campaigning by Patrick and others, a national Windrush Day was adopted on the 22 June 2019, to preserve the legacy of the Windrush Generation. Find out more at this webinar.
